So I'm pleased that we've been able to secure \$2.6 million to undertake natural waterway rehabilitation and drainage construction / resilience in the next year.

I look forward to Council undertaking this project as a matter of urgency.




## LOCAL PARKS UPGRADES

Bellbowrie is a winner in this year's Budget when it comes to park and playground upgrades.

Playground equipment in both Consider Place and Pioneer Crescent Parks, Bellbowrie will be replaced at a total cost of \$306,000.

In addition, \$343,000 will be spent on upgrading the skate bowl at Booker Place Park, Bellbowrie while the Green Hill Reservoir Park at Chapel Hill will receive an \$111,000 upgrade.



## Local Road Improvements

Council will undertake road resurfacing totalling more than \$2.2 million in the Pullenvale Ward during the next 12 months, including a much awaited upgrade of Kenmore Road.

## Resurfacing works on Kenmore Road



Brisbane City Council has allocated more than \$14.8 million for a range of projects in the Pullenvale Ward for 2020/21.

I'm pleased to announce that following my representations, \$550,000 will be spent on resurfacing part of Kenmore Road. A further \$506,000 will be spent on major traffic improvements at the Kenmore Road and Fig Tree Pocket Road intersection.

Just over \$8 million has been allocated for resurfacing, kerb and channel works (Kenmore and Chapel Hill), footpath reconstruction (Moggill Road, Bellbowrie), safer paths to schools (Moggill State School), congestion busting projects (Rafting Ground Road and Brookfield Road), reconstruction and rehabilitation of bridges and culverts (Upper Brookfield and Kholo), upgrading and maintaining our neighbourhood and suburban parks, playground replacements, and the management of conservation reserves (Kholo).

Also, significant funding will be spent on enhancements at Mt Coot-tha Botanic Gardens while more than \$2.6 million has been allocated to address Brisbane River erosion issues impacting the properties of residents at Illawong Way, Karana Downs.



### A message from Greg

I'm proud to be part of Lord Mayor Adrian Schrinner's administration and delivering for my community during the current health and economic crisis.

The Lord Mayor needed to make some tough decisions as a result of losing more than \$180 million in revenue as a result of the coronavirus pandemic.

## Delivering a responsible budget to help rebuild our economy

We have backed up a 16-year track record of Budget surpluses, with another surplus this year through responsible financial management. This means we have more resources available to help families, businesses and community groups to get back on their feet.

This includes initiatives such as a six-month Rates Freeze, and an extra \$250 support for those most in need.



## Investing in critical infrastructure to keep Brisbane moving

We will continue to fix congestion and improve traffic flow with \$344.8 million allocated over four years, in partnership with the Federal Government, through the Better Roads for Brisbane program.

This Budget, \$360 million is invested over four years for our Smoother Suburban Streets program to ensure Brisbane residents get home quicker and safer.



## Creating a safer environment for school children

Safety of school students is a priority. We will invest \$2.9 million in Speed Awareness Monitors as part of our SAMs for Schools project to make sure children feel safe walking or riding to school, in addition to \$6.4 million already allocated to creating Safer Paths to School.



## Delivering on our key projects



### Brisbane Metro

The turn-up-and-go Brisbane Metro is going to create 2600 jobs and hundreds of supplier opportunities and just like Brisbane, Metro keeps getting better.

When the first Metro services start in 2023/24, Brisbane residents will get home quicker and safer on world-class electric vehicles.



### Victoria Park Vision

Work on our biggest park in 50 years is gaining pace. We will invest \$3.3 million to finalise the design and construction of Victoria Park and \$83 million over the next four years to bring the park to life. Construction will start in 2021/22.



### Fast-tracking green bridges

To get jobs and supplier opportunities rolling faster we announced \$23.2 million in the next year to get started on two of those green bridges at Kangaroo Point and Breakfast Creek, with more than \$300 million over four years to finish these signature projects.



## Extending First Home Buyers help to new home purchases

In this budget we have retained and extended our popular 50% first homeowners rates reduction to 100% for those buying off-the-plan or a newly constructed home to live in for the first year after purchase.



## Immediate support to Community and Sports Clubs

So many community groups have lost revenue due to coronavirus restrictions. We took early action to waive lease fees and charges to help these organisations and provided a one-off \$5,000 rebate to sporting clubs so they could water their fields ahead of reopening.

We have announced \$3 million more in direct assistance for community groups on Council land to help them rebuild after this pandemic.



## Investing in our Parks and Sport Facilities

Health and lifestyle are priorities for Council and we have committed \$271.4 million over four years to deliver new sports parks, suburban parks and upgrades to neighbourhood parks. This investment also includes \$130 million for delivering Iconic Parks for Brisbane.



## Revitalising our neighbourhoods and suburban shopping precincts

We are revitalising suburbs through the successful Village Precinct Projects and creating a city of quaint but vibrant neighbourhoods. Council will design and deliver improvements, breathing new life into local shopping precincts to stimulate the local economy.

Over four years we are investing \$8.8 million to support our Greener Suburbs program which provides major landscaping and tree planting across the city.
